Capturing nearly a bird's-eye view of the Valley below, this uncommon hillside abode located in North Scottsdale was purposely situated to capture a dramatic skyline from sunrise to sunset.

A hand glazed raku ceramic sculpture by Japanese artist **Jun Kaneko** occupies its own special alcove on the intermediate landing of the stairs. Represented by **Gerald Peters Contemporary Gallery** in Santa Fe, **Kaneko**'s work brings a sense of joy and intrigue.

A beautiful abstract landscape by the late Tucson-based artist Nancy Tokar Miller hangs in the stairwell. The dramatic movement often seen in her vivid, though non-representational, work is blanketed with serenity.

This handsome setting at the main entrance is a poetic nod to the homeowner's years competing on the national roping circuit and his lifetime passion of training and breeding horses.

rganically based elements in this home — the color, texture, and even its generous scale, were heavily influenced by the natural desert landscape and the surrounding Valley mountain range. For interior designer Holly Ogden, a partner at Wiseman & Gale Interiors, this commission is proclaimed to be amongst her career favorites. In a time where the heart of the home beats louder than ever, this residence echoes the sentiments of a life well lived, and well loved. Chic, stylish, tailored, refined, and relaxed; these are the words that come to mind when one walks through the massive set of steel doors that flank the entrance to this home. A strong appreciation for aesthetics is evident in every mindful detail throughout. The success of this project, headed by master builder Anthony Salcito (whose company, Salcito Custom Homes, has earned a decades-long reputation for constructing some of the most prominent residences in North Scottsdale) was a fait accompli prior to groundbreaking simply by the coming together of this extraordinary team. Then architects of PHX Architecture, Scott Carson (now of Cosan Studio), and Gene Kniaz (now of Spiral Architects), suc ceeded one another with plans for a hillside hacienda that would rival any other. This home - which inevitably took on a bit of its own personality, evolving through masterful tweaks of many minds - was built.







Reminiscent of the grand dining chambers of Europe, this expansive room can seat up to twelve comfortably. The overall design is decisively subtle, yet eclectic, exposing a variety of interesting twists. A modern machinist touch was added with the suite of Carte chairs from Mattaliano - highlighted by their polished nickel riveted side bars. Beautifully handcrafted textural accents, such as the nubby wool area rug from Holland & Sherry and the raw linen sheers from Opuzen, add a warm, earthy sentiment. Designer Holly Ogden's ability to meld timeless elements into a current setting filled with intrigue and artistry can be seen most notably in her custom furnishings. This massive trestle-style table built by Allaire, Inc. is one example. Anchoring the room with its size and stature, it offers a surprising lightness with its narrow yet distinct straightlined, metal stretcher detailing. The hand-carved armoire built by **Taber & Company** is yet another custom piece that celebrates the handiwork of a craftsman, while adding both a sculptural and functional element. The crown jewel in this vignette might very well be Ogden's well thought-out choice of illumination. The pair of hand-forged iron chandeliers from Gregorius Pineo cast spiraling shadows throughout the room's hand plastered wall, ceiling, and European oak hardwood floors. Bringing a simple touch of whimsy during the day, their personality dramatically transforms after sunset to add an utterly romantic ambiance for family get-togethers and special evening or holiday affairs.

In keeping with the overall relaxed, European ambiance throughout, designer Holly Ogden incorporated a rich collection of furnishings, artwork, and accessories. The hand-selected sprinkling of items such as the classic grandfather clock (shown right) lends itself to the heartfelt feeling of walking into a "forever home" — a sentiment which has been a tradition, if not a trademark, of Wiseman & Gale's widely appreciated aesthetic for many years.

ess is clearly more when it comes to the design of this generous guest bath. Driven by the purist principle that form follows function, Holly Odgen has created a striking setting that is delightfully absent of clutter and exposes the elements of light, texture, and pattern in a contrasting though rhythmic way. The unconventional, almost clever positioning of the deep, freestanding soaking tub was another brilliant move by Ogden — as it instantly recast this lavish bath into a room with a view.

Because of the overall location of this room, the new configuration allowed a simple setting to quickly transform into a bain de soleil, with sunlight streaming throughout. Although this is not the primary bathroom in the home, there is nothing secondary when it comes to the exquisite design, construction, and craftsmanship of this room. A desire of one of the two daughters, the stunning wall of polished Nero Marquina laid in a chevron pattern, is one of the most powerful, yet unassuming design elements in the home.
